LL PD Investigates

LADY LAKE - Lady Lake Police officers responded to an altercation involving multiple people at the basketball courts at Guava Street Athletic Complex, located at 221 W. Guava St., on Thursday, July 18, at 7:29 p.m.

During the altercation, a suspect described as a light-skinned Black male with locs hairstyle and a red tattoo behind his ear retrieved a handgun from his white four-door sedan, possibly a Hyundai. As he left the area, he fired the weapon towards people at the basketball court. No one was injured.

Officers quickly secured the scene. Lady Lake Police conducted a thorough search of the surrounding neighborhoods, with assistance from the Lake County Sheriff’s Office and the Fruitland Park Police Department. Detectives interviewed witnesses and collected evidence. The search for the suspect and vehicle is ongoing.

“Hundreds of people -- including youth sports teams, families, and seniors -- enjoy our athletic fields and parks every week without issue,” said Police Chief Steve Hunt. “Lady Lake Police will continue to work to ensure our parks remain safe for everyone.”

The FAIRtax provides a progressive program called a prebate. This gives every LEGAL household an advanced refund at the beginning of each month so that purchases made up to the poverty line level are tax free. This prevents an unfair tax burden being placed on low-income households.

Once an item has been taxed (when new) it is not taxable again eliminating the double and sometimes triple taxation that comes with today's income tax system. You, the American taxpayer, will be in control of how much you pay in taxes through your spending habits not on how much money you make. If you are thrifty, you will pay lower taxes than someone who is not. Tax evasion and the underground economy costs each taxpayer today an additional \$2,500 every year. But by taxing new products and services consumed, the FAIRtax puts everyone in the country on the same level at the cash register.

Under the FAIRtax, the dreaded IRS will no longer be needed. There will be no more complicated tax forms, no individual audits and no intrusive federal bureaucracy requiring you to tell the government more about your financial life than you are willing to tell your own children. The FAIRtax is a national sales tax that treats every person equally and allows American businesses to thrive while generating the same tax revenue as the four-million-word-plus tax code we now live under. The FAIRtax is NOT an add-on but a REPLACEMENT of the current income tax.

Under the FAIRtax, for the first time in recent history, American workers will bring home what they earn with the elimination of federal withholding from their paychecks giving them an instant raise in take-home. Social Security and Medicare benefits will not change. In fact, the FAIRtax actually puts these programs on a more solid foundation. Instead of being funded by worker's wages, which is a relatively small pool, they will be funded by taxes on overall

They will then submit it to the state taxing authority which will in turn pass it along to the US Treasury. Both the retailers and the states will be paid a fee for their collection services.

When Planning International Travel



When Planning International Travel, Measles Vaccination is Peace of Mind for the Whole Family

(NAPSI)—As a parent, I know that preparing for international travel with kids is more than just packing a suitcase. Whether we are visiting relatives we haven't seen for a long time or helping our children see the world, we all can agree that protecting our family's health is the top priority. As a doctor, I know that beyond sorting out missing socks and packing suitcases, there is another important step to prepare for international travel: measles vaccination. Your whole family needs to be protected by measles vaccination, including babies as young as six months old.

While the risk for measles in the U.S. remains thankfully low due to high rates of immunization, measles can occur anywhere in the world, and you can be exposed during international travel. Every year, U.S. residents who are unvaccinated get measles while traveling internationally and get sick after they come home, often spreading it to others. Measles is more than just a little rash; it's a serious disease that can cause severe complications, especially in young children. Measles is also highly contagious. If one person has it, up to 9 out of 10 people nearby can become infected if they are not vaccinated.

The good news is that two doses of the

measles, mumps, and rubella (MMR) vaccine provide safe, long-lasting protection against measles. While most children receive their first dose of MMR vaccine around 1 year old, babies as young as six months old who are traveling overseas should get an early dose to help protect them when they are the most vulnerable. And while most children get their 2nd dose after the age of 4, children between 1 and 4 years of age should get a 2nd dose before traveling internationally to provide the best protection.

Why risk being exposed away from home when you can protect the whole family by vaccination? It takes about two weeks to develop protection from the vaccine, so now is the time to plan before you take a trip. If your trip is less than 2 weeks away, you can still get a dose of MMR vaccine. As a reminder, college kids or young adults traveling might need a dose, too, if they didn't get all of them as a children. As a doctor, I hope you will talk with your own doctor, nurse, or clinic about measles vaccination to protect the whole family. As a dad, I might never find that missing sock—but I'll have peace of mind knowing my family is protected from disease by vaccination.

What projects qualify? These incentives cover projects that tackle your home's biggest energy users, such as heating and cooling systems, water heaters, insulation, and more. These areas are not only the biggest energy users, they're essential systems that are expensive to upgrade. By taking advantage of these incentives, you can significantly reduce the cost of purchase, as well as your energy bills.

What savings are available? There are numerous ways homeowners can save on upfront costs:

Federal tax credits: Tax credits provide annual discounts of 30% of project costs, up to \$3,200, for products such as heat pump HVAC, heat pump water heaters, windows, and insulation.

State Rebates: As of May 2024, state rebate programs offer incentives available depending on your income. These include a discount of up to \$8,000 for switching to an ENERGY STAR-certified electric heat pump HVAC system and \$1,750 for installing an ENERGY STAR-certified electric heat pump water heater. You can find rebates offered in New York on the home savings tool and learn the status of other state programs here.

Utility Rebates: In addition to the Inflation Reduction Act incentives, many utilities offer rebates on ENERGY STAR-certified appliances and equipment.

ENERGY STAR is the government-backed symbol for energy efficiency,

Honoring Our Vietnam Veterans Who Served In Dustoff Crews

I am proud to co-sponsor H.R. 1015, the Dustoff Crews of the Vietnam War Congressional Gold Medal Act. Dustoff crews performed aeromedical evacuations from May 1962 to March 1973, proving to be the difference between life and death for wounded personnel.

Being a Dustoff Crewmember in Vietnam meant a 1 in 3 chance of being wounded or

killed. They constantly operated in complete darkness, in bad weather, over mountainous terrain, and braved intense enemy fire.

I'm pleased to join Rep. Cathy McMorris Rodgers and Rep. Derek Kilmer in this important bill to award these heroes their due.

Defending Our Dairy Farmers

I'm a proud co-sponsor of the DAIRY PRIDE Act, a bill that prohibits the sale of any food that uses the market name of a dairy product (such as milk, yogurt, or cream cheese) unless the food (1) is the milk of a hooved animal, (2) is derived from such milk, or (3) contains such milk as a primary ingredient.

We're tremendously proud of our dairy products in Florida and support their recognition as what they are: true dairy products.

Protecting Medicaid

I was glad to join my colleagues in signing onto H.R. 7014, the Protect Medicaid Act. The bill prohibits federal payment under Medicaid for the administrative costs of providing health benefits to noncitizens who are ineligible for Medicaid based on their immigration status. American taxpayers shouldn't be on the hook for the health care of those in the country illegally.

Congresswoman Kat Cammack, Senator Rick Scott Lead Legislation To Expand HSAs, Support Families Using IVF

WASHINGTON, D.C. —Congresswoman Kat Cammack and Senator Rick Scott introduced the Increasing Value for Families (IVF) with HSAs Act to help individuals and families better plan and pay for medical expenses,

like in vitro fertilization (IVF), by decoupling Health Savings Accounts (HSA) from high-deductible health plans, and doubling the current contribution limits on HSAs from \$4,300 to \$8,600 for individuals and \$8,550 to \$17,100 for families.

Senator Scott and Rep. Cammack are also leading a bicameral resolution expressing their full support of IVF.

"I'm pleased to join Senator Scott on this effort to support American families and look forward to growing the legislation's support in the House," said Rep. Kat Cammack. "Building and growing a family is part of the American dream for millions in our country, but for too many parents and parents-to-be, IVF's high costs put the option out of reach. By expanding HSA eligibility and increasing contribution limits for those HSAs, we're pursuing solutions that will help make dreams reality. I'm proud of Florida legislators' leadership on this issue and encourage my colleagues to join me in standing by our young families."

Senator Rick Scott said, "IVF is a wonderful thing that enables so many Americans to start and grow their families. For me and my family, the blessing of IVF is personal, as my youngest daughter is currently undergoing IVF treatments to grow her family. While IVF is a blessing that is widely available and overwhelmingly supported, its high cost remains a barrier for many families and that's something that ought to change. Today, I'm proud to introduce the Increasing Value for Families (IVF) with HSAs Act to help support current and aspiring parents looking at IVF as a way to grow their family, and be joined by Rep. Kat Cammack who will lead this effort in the House. Our proposal allows every individual and family to better plan and pay for medical expenses, such as IVF, by expanding eligibility for Health Savings Accounts and increasing the current contribution limits on those HSAs. This bill is commonsense and what American families expect out of Washington – solutions that make their lives easier and dreams possible. I urge all of our colleagues to join us in fighting to quickly

pass this bill and help families plan for medical expenses, and hopefully expand their families and bring more beautiful children into the world."





Ashley Moody urges Senate to pass SAVE Act for election security

Florida Attorney General Ashley Moody and a coalition of 22

state attorneys general are urging the U.S. Senate to pass the Safeguard American Voter Eligibility Act (SAVE Act), which aims to prevent illegal voting by ensuring only American citizens can vote in elections.

“The SAVE Act is crucial legislation that ensures only Americans vote in American elections, and I strongly urge the United States Senate to pass this bill,” Moody said on Tuesday.

The attorneys general sent a letter to congressional leaders expressing concerns that President **Joe Biden's** immigration policies have led to a rise in illegal immigration, which they argue could undermine election security.

The consortium pointed to instances where it was alleged that noncitizens are allowed to vote in local elections and noted that some states, like Arizona, permit noncitizens to vote in federal elections if they register without proof of citizenship.

“The SAVE Act protects our elections from illegal immigrants and upholds the rule of law,” the letter states. “Under the SAVE Act, individuals must provide proof of citizenship when registering to vote.” The act also allows states to access federal databases to identify and remove noncitizens from voter rolls.

Moody's endorsement aligns with Florida's efforts to enhance election security, including requiring proof of citizenship and photo ID for voter registration.

The coalition includes attorneys general from Alabama, Arkansas, Georgia, Idaho, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, New Hampshire, Oklahoma, South Carolina, South Dakota, Tennessee, Utah, Virginia, West Virginia and Wyoming.

ATTORNEY GENERAL MOODY AND COALITION CALL ON US SENATE TO PASS SAVE ACT TO ENSURE ONLY AMERICANS VOTE IN AMERICAN ELECTIONS

Attorney General Ashley Moody and a coalition of state attorneys general today called on the United States Senate to pass the Safeguard American Voter Eligibility Act, or the SAVE Act, to ensure election integrity by protecting United States elections from illegal voters. The attorneys general call the bill a “common-sense reform” that has broad support among American voters.

Attorney General Ashley Moody said, “The SAVE Act is important legislation that ensures only Americans vote in American elections, and I along with my colleagues strongly urge the United States Senate to pass this bill.”

In a letter sent to congressional leaders,

the attorneys general note, “President Biden's immigration disaster now threatens the security of America's elections. During this surge in illegal immigration, cities and States across the country have started allowing noncitizens to vote in their elections. But allowing illegal voters in State and local elections, while bad enough, does not remain confined to just those elections. Indeed, some States have taken an even odder approach. Arizona's Secretary of State explains that voters who register to vote without proof of citizenship will be designated 'federal-only' voters, meaning they are allowed to vote in federal, but not state or local, elections.”

The attorneys general go on to say, “The SAVE Act protects our elections from illegal immigrants and upholds the rule of law. Under the SAVE Act, individuals must provide proof of citizenship when registering to vote. The SAVE Act also will help States identify and remove illegal immigrants from their voter registration rolls by providing States with access to federal databases. Those simple, common-sense reforms will protect our elections.”

The 22-state coalition is strongly urging Congress to pass the SAVE Act to provide necessary security and ensure only Americans participate in American elections.

Concerningly, some members of Congress have taken the bait from drug companies and are considering misguided policies targeting PBMs. For example, a proposed policy called “delinking” is being pushed as a solution, yet respected economists from the University of Chicago, USC Schaeffer Center, and Jack Kemp Foundation agree that the policy would instead increase costs for patients, employers, and taxpayers.

Fortunately, encouraging innovation in the pharmacy benefits market is improving how patients access and pay for their prescription drugs. For example:

The PBM marketplace has grown more competitive with over 70 full-service companies offering varying benefit design and contracting options.

In light of rising drug prices, PBMs have implemented new innovative offerings to help employers lower out-of-pocket costs for patients.

PBMs have responded to the high list prices of popular GLP-1 weight loss medications by negotiating savings and providing employers options to cover these drugs.

Greater biosimilar uptake is being encouraged by PBMs, as a more affordable alternative to high-priced brand name drugs.

PBMs are empowering pharmacists to practice at the top of their license and implementing programs to support rural pharmacies.

Policymakers have an opportunity to deliver what patients need when it comes to prescription drugs – lower costs and better

[Governor Ron DeSantis Awards More Than \\$12 Million in Northwest Florida Through the Job Growth Grant Fund](#)

PENSACOLA, Fla.—Today, Governor Ron DeSantis awarded funds for workforce development and infrastructure improvements through the Florida Job Growth Grant Fund (JGGF) and the Defense Infrastructure Grant (DIG). Awards were made to Pensacola State College, the city of DeFuniak Springs, Santa Rosa County, and Jackson County for projects that will support the aviation and aerospace industry, the military and defense industry, and increase access to workforce housing.

“Today’s awards will help bring high demand, high wage jobs and businesses to Northwest Florida,” said **Governor Ron DeSantis**. “These strategic investments will benefit Escambia, Walton, Santa Rosa and Jackson counties and provide new opportunities for families from across the Panhandle.”

“Governor DeSantis’ focus on catalytic infrastructure and workforce investments, especially in sectors such as manufacturing, aerospace and aviation, and military and defense, will continue to bring job creators and job seekers to Northwest Florida,” said **Secretary of Commerce J. Alex Kelly**. “I’m especially grateful for the Governor’s support of the community-driven visions in each of these projects.”

The following entities will receive an award through the Florida Job Growth Grant Fund:

▪ **Pensacola State College (\$4,410,000)** – to establish a new Airframe and Powerplant Mechanics program. This project will support the construction of a new hanger, training equipment, and operating costs for the education program which will be located at the Pensacola Airport.

▪ **DeFuniak Springs (\$3,051,550)** – to construct two 6,400-square-foot hangers, one 10,000-square-foot hanger, a taxiway, an access road, and associated utilities. This infrastructure will allow the airport to attract new innovative employers in aerospace and defense, including Advanced Air Mobility (AAM). The project will create 500 jobs and have a total estimated fiscal impact of more than \$12.3 million.

▪ **Jackson County (\$4,680,059)** – to connect a workforce housing development with an industrial area with a new 1.3-mile, two-lane road. This project will create at least jobs 400 new jobs and has an estimated impact of \$12.5 million. This award builds on more than \$23 million in strategic investments in Jackson County, including more than \$15 million through the Rural Infrastructure Fund, more than \$7 million through the Broadband Opportunity Program, and \$1.5 million through the Florida Small

Cities Community Development Block Grant program to encourage job creation, capital investment, and economic development.

The Florida Job Growth Grant Fund is an economic development program designed to promote public infrastructure and workforce training across the state. Proposals are reviewed by FloridaCommerce and are chosen by Governor DeSantis to meet the demands for workforce training or infrastructure needs in communities around the state.

The following entity will receive an award through the Defense Infrastructure Grant:

▪ **Santa Rosa County Whiting Aviation Park – Security Fence Project (\$500,000)** – to create a secure, double-entry gate system connecting NAS Whiting Aviation Park. This will allow aircraft to move safely and efficiently between the base and maintenance area, which will enhance security and maintenance operations. A new electronic gate will also speed up emergency response and provide a secure route for personnel and equipment.

Defense Infrastructure Grants support transportation and access, housing, utilities, communications, and security needs for military communities across the state.

equity and access—emphasize that the best way to reduce the risk of severe illness from both flu and COVID-19 is to stay up to date with recommended vaccinations.

Some viruses, such as those that cause measles and polio, change infrequently. This means that the vaccines for these viruses can provide immunity that is longer-lasting. By contrast, frequent changes in the viruses that cause COVID-19 and flu mean the protection provided by these vaccines will wane as new variants emerge.

Flu and COVID-19 are serious diseases. Between October 1, 2023, and June 1, 2024, there were approximately 44,000 deaths attributed to COVID-19, and at least 24,000 deaths associated with flu. These numbers highlight the ongoing importance of staying current with vaccinations to protect yourself and your family from these viruses.

Updated flu and COVID-19 vaccines will be available this fall that are formulated to protect against the variants that are most likely to be circulating during the upcoming respiratory illness season. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends the 2024-2025 COVID-19 vaccines and routine annual influenza vaccines for individuals aged 6 months and older.

COVID-19 remains a serious threat to public health and still poses significant risks. Staying current on your flu and COVID-19 vaccines is the best way to maintain protection from these illnesses. Help reduce the risk of interruptions and challenges that come from upticks in flu and COVID-19 infections by getting vaccinated this fall.

How To Teach Your Children To Be Household Helpers



consuming, involving your children in the home can bring a sense of joy and togetherness, helping them gain confidence, a sense of accountability, and a deeper connection to their family members.

If you're thinking, "But where do I start?" the key is in the approach and consistency.

thumb, your child should be assigned one role or responsibility for each year of age. If they're three years old, give them three tasks. Make sure the tasks fit their developmental level. If you make them too difficult, they could get frustrated along the way.

It's all about learning and growth. If you

keep this top of mind, you're bound to be successful. Take the time to explain and demonstrate each task, then do the task with the child the first few times. After that, let them try it on their own. It won't be perfect, but each attempt is a step towards independence. Set expectations with your child and be clear in your ask. Take each task one at a time to avoid overwhelming your child.

Your encouragement is crucial. If you tried to do something new and failed repeatedly, you, too, would begin to feel discouraged. Remember, your child may feel the same when taking on new roles and responsibilities. Your positive feedback and support can make a world of difference. Tell them what you liked and what they did well. Encourage your child along the way and keep it fun—turn up the tunes, start dancing, and get to work. As they gain more independence with the task, make sure to tell them how and why they're doing a great job.

Don't forget the transitions. Use "first-then" sentences to break a multi-step activity into two components. "First, we're

going to put away our race cars, and then we'll start cooking dinner." Timers are great visual and auditory cues to help your child know when it's time to stop what they're doing and move on to another task. The timers should be fun, interactive, and visible for your child. The timer should be implemented when you're ready to follow through and should be used consistently. While using them, be sure to give verbal time updates and warnings, as time lengths will vary per child and task. This tool removes the person-to-person dynamic and helps your child understand the concept of transitions.

Each of these tips is also a best-practice teacher tool, so check in with your child's teacher to see how they may introduce roles, responsibilities, and transitions with your child that you can carry over at home. For more information and resources, visit KinderCare.com.
