## WEC Webber Suit Online Info

On April 17th, Charlotte Weber filed a Complaint for Declaratory and Injunctive Relief and a Petition for Writ of Certiorari against Golden Ocala and Marion County over the approvals for the Sports Complex. Also on April 17th, Ms. Weber filed a Petition for a Formal Administrative Hearing against Marion County.

As noted in the complaints, the Marion County Commission voted to approve several land development applications submitted by Golden Ocala at a Board hearing on March 18, 2026, authorizing the development of a 250-acre sports and entertainment facility on property adjacent to Ms. Weber's iconic 4,300-acre horse farm, Live Oak Stud.

One of the key points made is the 2016 agreement to limit the use of the property, proposed for the Sports Complex, to low-density residential.

The complaint states: The land development approvals are legally invalid and were unlawfully approved for numerous reasons:

Golden Ocala violated a 2016 agreement with Plaintiff (Charlotte Weber) in which Golden Ocala agreed to limit the use the same property to large-lot residential Equestrian Estates;

So Weber agreed to allow the land use next to at the request of Golden Ocala and the land use where Marion County had to rule. So now they are not putting in large lot equestrian lot Estates but Weber charges a Sports complex. So Weber is suing Marion County, Golden Hills and WEC! What a confusing mess. If Marion County allow for the land use change they are guilty like they have been so many other times. THANK YOU Charlotte Weber for putting the Marion County in their place. Remember WEC is a big money driver but so is Live

Oak Stud farm. Who is at fault I do not know that is for the law to decide.

In another project Marion County said they would not approve the gas line that went through my land. Swore up and down they were on the land owners side. Based on that I threw the gas line people off my property.

Next thing I was in court fighting the gas line by myself, the county was no where in sight. There were many people lied to so, don't feel alone. We got paid but I did not want a gas line running through my farm. I went to town meeting and called them liars to their face.

Someone or something left the gate open! Now we receive a letter saying they may want to run something along the Gas Line. That is not theirs to decide, here we go with another legal battle!

## Lady Lake Library Donates School Supplies to Local Students Through Annual Fine Forgiveness Program

The Lady Lake Library's annual School Supplies for Fines initiative helped support local students while giving library patrons an opportunity to clear overdue fines through community giving.

This year, the library collected 20 backpacks, 15 binders, five prepackaged school supply kits, 50 folders, 50 notebooks, packs of glue, crayons and markers, paper, disinfecting wipes, and many other classroom essentials for students at The Villages Elementary of Lady Lake. In total, the library forgave nearly \$750 in overdue fines as part of the program.

"We're incredibly grateful for the generosity of our community," said Library Director Aly Herman. "Every donation helps ensure local students have the supplies they need to start the school year prepared, while also helping library patrons return to using our services."

The annual initiative encourages community support for local schools while reducing barriers to library access by allowing patrons to donate new school supplies in place of paying eligible overdue fines.

## Town Awarded \$1M Water Reclamation

**Town receives \$1M for water reclamation project.**

The Town of Lady Lake has been awarded a \$1 million State of Florida appropriation to support the next phase of improvements to the Town's Water Reclamation Facility.

The state funding, secured with the support of State Rep. Nan Cobb and State Sen. Keith Truenow, will help advance Phase III of the Water Reclamation Facility expansion, a critical infrastructure project designed to accommodate Lady Lake's growth while protecting the region's water resources. Rep. Nann Cobb presented the check to Mayor Ed Freeman and Public Works Director C.T. Eagle during Monday's Town Commission meeting.

Phase III of the project calls for expanding the facility's treatment capacity to 3 million gallons per day, implementing advanced wastewater treatment and increasing the Town's reclaimed water capabilities. The improvements are intended to address capacity constraints, enhance nutrient removal and support compliance with the Silver Springs and Upper Ocklawaha Basin Management Action Plans.

The funding will support engineering

design and permitting for the expansion, including engineering drawings, technical specifications and permit applications needed to prepare the project for construction.

Once completed, the expansion will provide additional wastewater treatment capacity for existing customers as well as future residential and commercial development. The project is expected to serve Lady Lake's existing and incoming residents while also benefiting surrounding communities through improved protection of groundwater, springs and surface waters.

"We are extremely grateful to Rep. Cobb, Sen. Truenow, and our state partners for recognizing the importance of investing in the infrastructure that supports Lady Lake's future," said Town Manager Bill Lawrence. "This funding allows us to continue planning responsibly for the growth we know is coming."

The project is currently in the planning phase. The funding request identifies an anticipated construction start of July 2027, with completion estimated for late 2029. Ongoing operation and maintenance will be supported through the Town's Wastewater Utility Enterprise Fund.

## Operation Southern Slow Down

**Lady Lake Police Department reports results of Operation Southern Slow Down**

**LADY LAKE** - The Lady Lake Police Department conducted 164 traffic stops as part of the 2026 Operation Southern Slow Down campaign, a regional traffic safety initiative aimed at reducing speed-related crashes and fatalities through increased enforcement and public education.

The enforcement campaign ran July 13-18. During that period, Lady Lake officers reported:

- 164 total traffic stops
- 10 citations issued
- 154 warnings issued
- 3 arrests for operating while license suspended

Operation Southern Slow Down is an annual traffic safety campaign conducted in partnership with the Florida Department of Transportation, Florida Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles, Florida Highway Patrol, local law

## Beef Shortage

Tyson's beef unit swung to a quarterly operating loss and reported volumes down while prices rose, a classic sign of tight input supply. Executives told investors the beef segment lost \$138 million in the quarter, with volume down nearly 16 percent and pricing up about 12 percent, reflecting constrained supply and higher cattle costs.

Management had already warned that full-year beef losses would widen if supplies stayed tight, and later trimmed the company's profit outlook as the cattle shortage dragged on.

enforcement agencies and transportation and law enforcement partners throughout the Southeastern United States.

The campaign combines targeted enforcement with education to remind motorists of the dangers associated with excessive speed and encourage safer driving habits.

"Operation Southern Slow Down is all about changing driving behavior before that behavior results in a serious or fatal crash," said Cpl. Andru Eckerdt. "The fact that the majority of our contacts resulted in warnings gave our officers an opportunity to educate drivers and reinforce a simple message: slow down, stay alert and help us keep Lady Lake's roads safe."

The Lady Lake Police Department encourages drivers to obey posted speed limits, allow adequate following distance and remain attentive behind the wheel. Drivers are also reminded that speeding reduces reaction time and increases the severity of crashes.

Through participation in statewide and regional traffic safety initiatives such as Operation Southern Slow Down, the Lady Lake Police Department remains committed to proactive enforcement and education designed to make local roadways safer for residents and visitors.

The Lady Lake Police Department is joining law enforcement agencies across Florida and the nation for the Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over campaign, an enforcement and education effort aimed at keeping impaired drivers off the road. The campaign runs from Aug. 19-Sept. 7

\$400,000 Outsmart Lung Cancer

Double the Hope on Lung Cancer Research: \$400,000 to Outsmart Lung Cancer

08/18/2026  
(Erika Braaksma ) - While World Lung Cancer Day was recognized on August 1, the urgent need to raise global awareness for those affected by the disease and to accelerate the search for a cure remains year-round. With this ongoing mission in mind, Lung Cancer Foundation of America (LCFA) and the International Association for the Study of Lung Cancer (IASLC) are observing the month by awarding \$200,000 to two of the field's most promising young scientists. This investment addresses a critical reality in oncology: too often, brilliant research ideas stall not because they lack vision, but because they lack resources. By providing this funding, LCFA and IASLC are ensuring these researchers have the momentum they need to turn today's innovative ideas into tomorrow's life-saving breakthroughs.

The two funded projects take aim at two of the toughest questions in the fight against the disease: how to catch lung cancer earlier,

and how to stop it from outsmarting the very treatments designed to beat it. Both are essential to the same goal, helping patients live longer, better lives.

The Early Career Researcher (ECR) grant program gives emerging scientists the fuel they need to secure a major independent research award, which can be a launching pad for a career. These researchers aren't just studying the future of lung cancer science; they're building it.

This year's recipients, selected for the originality of their proposals and their potential to change patient outcomes, are Dr. Jared Mayers of Fred Hutch Cancer Center and Dr. Jaime L. Schneider of Dana-Farber Cancer Institute.

The timing could not be more urgent. Competition for research dollars grows fiercer every year, even as lung cancer claims a life in the United States every 4.2 minutes. When bold, early career investigators are handed real, independent funding, their most innovative ideas don't stall on a shelf. They move forward, and they change what's possible in oncology.

"Supporting early-career investigators is not just a strategic priority. It is a necessity for the future of oncology," said Kim Norris, co-founder and president of LCFA. "By investing in these researchers, we are accelerating the pace of discovery and ensuring that promising ideas in metabolic tracking and drug resistance can move from the laboratory to the clinic, where they are needed most."

## Meet the Award Recipients

Dr. Jared Mayers, Fred Hutch Cancer Center: Hunting the hidden influencers inside the lung. Dr. Mayers is investigating how the naturally occurring bacteria living in our lungs may quietly shape the development of lung cancer. Because these bacteria exist in such tiny amounts, they've long been nearly impossible to study. So Dr. Mayers is building the tools to see them by developing highly sensitive new techniques to capture and analyze how these microbes behave inside lung tissue. By mapping how they contribute to cancer, his team hopes to uncover entirely new ways to stop the disease before it ever starts.

Dr. Mayers says his inspiration is simple: "We don't get new drugs, we don't get new therapies, we don't get longer lives, better quality lives, more time with family unless we invest in the upfront groundwork."

Dr. Jaime L. Schneider, Dana-Farber Cancer Institute: Cutting off cancer's escape route. Dr. Schneider is decoding how lung cancer cells learn to survive and keep growing even after treatment. Her focus: how these cells manage their energy and where that system has a weak link worth exploiting. Her goal is to design new, more effective therapies that keep cancer from

adapting, offering better and longer-lasting options for patients whose disease has grown resistant to standard chemotherapy and targeted treatments.

"I was simply blown away by the tremendous arsenal of new drugs that had just come out that were really changing patient lives," said Dr. Schneider, describing what drew her to thoracic oncology.

LCFA and IASLC invite the community to go behind the science with all of the LCFA/IASLC ECR grant recipients. Visit these researchers' profiles and video insights into their lab work at LCFA's Meet the Researcher.

## The Multiplier Effect: Small Grants, Outsized Impact

LCFA's Early Career Research Grant Program is known for a remarkable "multiplier effect" currently at 13X return on investment. By providing the first spark for transformative science, the program has awarded 25 grants totaling \$4.6 million, funding that has since grown into more than \$50 million in additional grants from other organizations building on LCFA-supported research. That track record means Dr. Mayers and Dr. Schneider aren't just receiving funding, they're gaining the foundation to secure the major, long-term support their life-saving work deserves.

# Staying Safe When Power Goes Off

(NAPSI)—Generators are critical during severe weather events, when the power can go out. They can bring power to remote job sites, aid in disaster recovery and assist homeowners in emergencies. To help, the Outdoor Power Equipment Institute (OPEI), an international trade association representing power equipment, small engine, utility vehicle, golf car and personal transport vehicle manufacturers and suppliers, reminds home and business owners to keep safety in mind when using generators.

## Additional tips include:

- 1. Take stock of your generator.** Make sure equipment is in good working order before starting and using it. Do this before a storm hits.
- 2. Review the directions.** Follow all manufacturer's instructions. Review the owner's manuals (look manuals up online if you cannot find them and save a copy) so equipment is operated safely.
- 3. Install a battery-operated carbon monoxide detector in your home.** This alarm will sound if dangerous levels of carbon monoxide enter the building.
- 4. Have the right fuel on hand.** Use the type of fuel recommended by the generator manufacturer to protect this important investment. It's best to use fresh fuel, but if you are using fuel that has been sitting in a gas can for more than 30 days, add fuel stabilizer to it. Store gas only in an approved container and away from heat sources.
- 5. Ensure portable generators have plenty of ventilation.** Generators should NEVER be used in an enclosed area or

placed inside a home, a building, or a garage, even if the windows or doors are open. Place the generator outside and away from windows, doors, and vents that could allow carbon monoxide to drift indoors.

**6. Keep the generator dry.** Do not use a generator in wet conditions. Cover and vent a generator. Model-specific tents or generator covers can be found online for purchase and at home centers and hardware stores.

**7. Add fuel to a cool generator only.** Before refueling, turn the generator off and let it cool down.

**8. Plug in safely.** If you don't yet have a transfer switch, you can use the outlets on the generator. It's best to plug in appliances directly to the generator. If you must use an extension cord, it should be heavy-duty and designed for outdoor use. It should be rated (in watts or amps) at least equal to the sum of the connected appliance loads. Make sure the cord is free of cuts and the plug has all three prongs.

**9. Install a transfer switch.** A transfer switch connects the generator to the circuit panel and lets you power hardwired appliances. Most transfer switches also help avoid overload by displaying wattage usage levels.

**10. Do not use the generator to "backfeed" power into your home electrical system.** Trying to power your home's electrical wiring by "backfeeding"—where you plug the generator into a wall outlet—is dangerous. You could hurt utility workers and neighbors served by the same transformer. Backfeeding bypasses built-in circuit protection devices, so you could damage your electronics or start an electrical fire.

Cammack Delivers: More Than \$42 Million in Rural Health Investments for North Central Florida

Cammack helped craft and shepherd the Rural Health Transformation Program through committee, securing more than \$200 million for Florida and delivering critical resources to rural communities across FL-03.

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Congresswoman Kat Cammack (FL-03) today announced more than \$42.2 million in Rural Health Transformation Program investments benefiting health care providers and communities across North Central Florida, following her work in Congress to help craft and advance the legislation that created the program.

As a member of the House Energy and Commerce Committee and its Health Subcommittee, Cammack helped shape the rural health provisions and shepherd them through the committee process as part of the Working Families Tax Cuts law. The resulting Rural Health Transformation Program secured \$209 million for Florida in its first year alone, with funding now reaching rural hospitals, physicians, health systems, and communities across the state.

At least \$13.4 million is directly tied to providers with locations in Florida's Third Congressional District, while additional regional investments will strengthen health care infrastructure serving rural communities throughout North Central Florida.

CommunityHealth IT received more than

\$26.7 million across Florida's Northeast and Northwest regions to strengthen health information technology systems supporting rural providers, including those serving FL-03.

“This is exactly why I fought to make rural health care a priority in this legislation. I helped craft these provisions and shepherd them through Energy and Commerce because North Central Florida needed more than another study or another promise — we needed resources,” said Congresswoman Cammack. “We secured more than \$200 million for Florida, and now more than \$42 million is being put to work benefiting the communities I represent. That means stronger hospitals, better technology, more access to specialists, and more care delivered closer to home. We fought for these dollars, we secured them, and now we're bringing them home.”

Direct Investments in FL-03  
Providers headquartered in Florida's Third Congressional District receiving directly attributable awards include:

Medlink Management Services (Lake Butler Hospital), Union County — \$6,989,484.92 across two awards.

North Florida Pediatrics Associates, Lake City, Columbia County — \$5,999,924.26 across two awards.

Trenton Medical Center (Palms Medical Group), Gilchrist County — \$439,775.40.

Lake Butler Hospital's larger award supports preventive and at-home care, including mobile health, community paramedicine, remote patient monitoring, on-site pharmacy services, and retail clinic care.

North Florida Pediatrics Associates' larger Lake City award supports specialty and acute care through diagnostic technology and telehealth.

These investments directly address one of the most persistent challenges facing rural North Central Florida: distance. For seniors, working families, and patients managing chronic conditions, access to more services locally can mean fewer hours on the road and faster access to the care they need.

On Tuesday, Governor Ron DeSantis announced nearly \$188 million in the latest round of Year 1 awards, supporting more than 80 projects across Florida's 31 rural counties. The Northeast Region, which includes portions of FL-03 and surrounding North Central Florida communities, accounted for approximately \$50.7 million of the awards.

“Washington doesn't know Lake Butler, Lake City, or Trenton better than the people who live and work there. That's why we built flexibility into this program and fought to get Florida the resources to put solutions on the ground,”

Congresswoman Kat Cammack Secures Ten Amendments in House-Passed National Defense Authorization Act

Cammack amendments strengthen America's military by rooting China out of defense supply chains, countering foreign influence operations, protecting military families, and improving National Guard disaster readiness.

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Congresswoman Kat Cammack (FL-03) today announced that ten of her amendments were adopted in the National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2027 (H.R. 8800), which passed the House by a vote of 216-214. The legislation authorizes a pay raise for every service member and now advances to the Senate.

"Our troops deserve a raise and our adversaries deserve a reason to think twice. This bill delivers on both," said Congresswoman Cammack. "I fought to make sure it delivers accountability too. We

cannot just throw money at the Pentagon. My amendments force answers to hard questions about who is in our supply chains, whether we're ready for tomorrow's threats, and where American taxpayer dollars are going."

Together, Rep. Cammack's ten adopted amendments strengthen military readiness, reduce dependence on foreign adversaries, improve care for military families, accelerate the adoption of emerging technologies, and strengthen America's disaster response capabilities.

Congresswoman Cammack's Ten Adopted Amendments

Countering fentanyl and precursor chemicals. Requires the Department of War to expand coordination with the Department of Health and Human Services and the Department of Justice to target fentanyl and precursor chemicals. Requires a report to Congress identifying gaps in detection, monitoring, and interdiction efforts.

Combating foreign malign influence  
Reducing reliance on Chinese-sourced defense materials.

Strengthening partnerships with research universities.

Securing military medical supply chains.

Assessing threats from foreign-controlled digital platforms

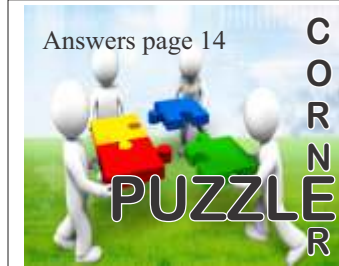
Accelerating artificial intelligence adoption.

Protecting military mothers during PCS moves.

Auditing Chinese Communist Party exposure in defense contracting.

Strengthening National Guard disaster readiness.

Taken together, these provisions position the Department of War to better compete in the era of cognitive warfare while strengthening America's military readiness at home and abroad.

### Attorney General James Uthmeier Issues Investigative Subpoena to KIS Consulting Over Deceptive Practices to Protect Homeowners from Increased Costs

Attorney General James Uthmeier issued an investigative subpoena to KIS Consulting, LLC as part of an investigation into the company's advertising of property inspection services, referrals of Florida consumers to attorneys and engineers for construction, design, architectural, and engineering defect claims, related sales tactics including door-to-door solicitation, and fees associated with those referrals.

"Florida homeowners deserve transparent and fair treatment when addressing potential defects in their homes—not practices that drive up the cost of homeownership," said Attorney General James Uthmeier. "My office is investigating these inspection and referral operations to ensure they truly serve the interests of the families they claim to help."

The subpoena requires production of documents from August 20, 2022, through the present by September 21, 2026, including:

- Advertisements to Florida consumers related to property inspection services or construction defect claims;
  - Documents provided to consumers regarding the referral of attorney services, including Attorney Selection Forms, and all related communications with consumers and attorneys;
  - Documents and communications related to the referral of engineering services;
  - Estimates for repairs and documents identifying completed repairs to Florida consumers' properties, including supporting documentation such as invoices, permits, engineering reports, photographs, and payments;
  - Written policies, procedures, guidance, and training manuals related to referrals of legal and engineering services and to door-to-door or other sales tactics;
  - Documents sufficient to identify all Florida consumers provided with property inspection services, all employees or independent contractors soliciting business, and all fees received for attorney or engineering referrals;
  - Documents concerning complaints, reports, investigations, and dispositions related to the company's services involving construction defect claims.
- This action reinforces Attorney General Uthmeier's commitment to enforcing Florida's consumer protection laws and protecting homeowners from unfair or deceptive trade practices.

Attorney General James Uthmeier announced that the Office of Statewide Prosecution secured a conviction against Kimberly Ruth Biting of Leesburg for exploiting an elderly widow by abusing a power of attorney and position of trust to steal approximately \$350,000.

"This defendant systematically exploited a vulnerable senior widow grieving the loss of her husband, abusing a power of attorney for herself, and isolate her from family," said Attorney General James Uthmeier. "Florida will not tolerate those who prey on our elderly under the guise of caregiving or trust. I thank the Leesburg Police Department, Senior Assistant Statewide Prosecutor Taylor Chatting, and Special Counsel Ana Sacco for their outstanding work securing this conviction."

According to the investigation, Biting obtained power of attorney over her elderly neighbor—a senior widow—shortly after the victim's husband died in August 2021. Over the next 15 to 18 months, Biting used that authority to issue numerous checks from the victim's accounts to her own accounts and those of others, make repeated ATM withdrawals confirmed by surveillance video, and transfer funds from investment accounts.

Biting used more than \$137,000 of the victim's money to purchase two parcels of land in Calhoun County that were titled to a trust in Biting's name. Substantial sums also went to her daughter and a paid caregiver, often framed as payments for services.

Evidence established that Biting restricted the victim's communications with family, controlled access within the home, and threatened to have the victim declared incompetent and committed. The victim ultimately left of her own free will, revoked the power of attorney, and relocated to New York to live with her sister. Biting subsequently reported the departure as a kidnapping.

Biting was convicted of:

- Elderly Exploitation (Breach of Power of Attorney), a first-degree felony
- Elderly Exploitation (Position of Trust or Confidence), a first-degree felony
- Elderly Exploitation (Negligent or Intentional Misuse), a first-degree felony
- Cashing or Depositing an Item with Intent to Defraud, a third-degree felony

Senior Assistant Statewide Prosecutor Taylor Chatting and Special Counsel Ana Sacco were designated as a Special Assistant State Attorneys by State Attorney Bill Gladson in the Fifth Judicial Circuit.

**Attorney General James Uthmeier  
Announces Arrest of Over 2,000 Child  
Predators; Charges Middle School  
Teacher with Possession of Child Sexual  
Abuse Material**

Attorney General James Uthmeier announced that over 2,000 child predators have been arrested since he took office in February 2025. The milestone reflects the aggressive work of the Office of Statewide

Prosecution in partnership with state and local law enforcement agencies to identify, arrest, and prosecute those who sexually exploit children.

"Protecting our children is my number one priority," said Attorney General James Uthmeier. "With over 2,000 child predators arrested since I took office, we are sending a clear message: if you prey on kids in this state, we will find you, arrest you, and put you behind bars. Thanks to our law enforcement partners and Statewide Prosecutors, we are breaking all-time records against predators."

"Florida is safer with the men and women at FDLE doing their very best to protect our communities from individuals who exploit and harm our children," said FDLE Commissioner Mark Glass. "Our agents and analysts will continue to work with our criminal justice partners and Attorney General James Uthmeier's Office of Statewide Prosecution to accomplish the mission of keeping our streets free from these criminals."

"At the Lee County Sheriff's Office, we are constantly looking ahead," said Sheriff Carmine Marceno. "We are not waiting for a child to become a victim before we act. We are investing in training, technology, intelligence, and the people who have dedicated their lives to protect protecting children. This is what proactive policing and solid partnerships look like."

"Some of these vile crimes are committed by people we trust with our kids. That is unacceptable. FDLE will continue to investigate these crimes and work with the Office of Statewide Prosecution to hold these individuals accountable, but it is a group effort that starts with secure internet habits," said FDLE Fort Myers Special Agent in Charge Eli Lawson. "Secure internet habits start at home. While families are getting ready for the school year to begin, I strongly encourage parents to have the important conversations with your children about safe online use."

"Thank you to Attorney General James Uthmeier, Sheriff Carmine Marceno, and every law enforcement entity and agent standing with us to protect children," said Lee County Schools Superintendent Dr. Denise Carlin. "The moment we were notified of this teacher's arrest, we acted immediately, removing him from the classroom and barring him from every

district property. I recommended he be terminated swiftly. Predators will find no harbor in The School District of Lee County."

Recent cases highlight the ongoing intensity of these efforts:

- Graham Freeman, 56, of Cape Coral, a middle school science teacher in Lee County School District, was arrested on August 6, 2026, and charged with 10 counts of possession of child sexual abuse material and one count of sexual activity involving animals. An FDLE investigation into peer-to-peer file sharing identified activity linked to his residence. Agents executed a search warrant and recovered multiple electronic devices containing the illegal material. Freeman has been removed from the classroom.

- Jordan Kent Hall, 33, of Sarasota, faces 10 counts of possession of child sexual abuse material and one count of sexual activities involving animals. Following an investigation of peer-to-peer network activity, FDLE agents executed a search warrant at his residence on July 30, 2026, and recovered devices containing the prohibited material.

- Matthew David Peter, 41, of Zephyrhills, faces charges of soliciting a child for unlawful sexual conduct using computer services, transmission of harmful material to a minor, and unlawful use of a two-way communications device to facilitate a felony. The charges stem from an undercover FDLE operation in which Peter engaged in sexually explicit communications with an agent posing as a 13-year-old girl and transmitted harmful material.

These prosecutions are part of a broader surge in results. Since February 2025, the Office of Statewide Prosecution's Crimes Against Children efforts have secured nearly 693 years of prison sentences—more than four times the previous monthly rate—while case filings have increased dramatically.

The cases against Freeman and Peter will be prosecuted in the Twentieth Judicial Circuit and Hall in the Twelfth Judicial Circuit by Assistant Statewide Prosecutor Agnieszka Thomas.

The event showcased Florida's commitment to putting students first by supporting teachers, empowering parents, and maintaining high academic standards that will continue to produce nation-leading results.

"Education changes the trajectory of a child's life. Every classroom, every lesson, every parent, and every educator help shape opportunities that extend far beyond the next grade level or graduation," said **Commissioner of Education Henry Mack**. "As we begin this school year, we remain committed to building on our successes and strengthening Florida's education system as a national model of excellence—challenging students to reach their highest potential, equipping them with the knowledge and skills to succeed in their future careers, and preparing them to make meaningful contributions to Florida and the United States as productive citizens."

As students return to classrooms across Florida, Governor DeSantis reaffirmed his commitment to building on Florida's momentum by continuing to invest in teachers, expanding educational opportunities through school choice, strengthening workforce education, and ensuring every student is prepared for success in college, career, and life.

Governor DeSantis highlighted Florida's historic student achievement gains. For the first time ever, more than 60% of Florida students are performing on or above grade level in both English language arts and mathematics. Since 2023, student performance on Florida's nation-leading progress monitoring assessments has increased in both English language arts and in mathematics.

Since 2019, the state has invested more than \$7 billion through the Teacher Salary Increase Allocation to raise teacher pay. As a result of these investments, Florida's average starting teacher salary has increased from \$40,000 to \$50,200 since 2019. to raising the salaries of experienced teachers with at least 10 years of service in Florida public schools.

Governor Ron DeSantis awarded nearly \$8.8 million to 12 small and rural communities across Northwest Florida to support critical infrastructure investments and community development projects. The funding, awarded through the Small Cities Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program and the Community Planning Technical Assistance (CPTA) Grant Program, will support projects that strengthen local infrastructure, enhance community resiliency and promote long-term economic growth. "This morning in Bonifay, I was pleased to announce more than \$8.8 million in funding for critical infrastructure and community development projects in 12 small and rural Florida communities," said **Governor Ron DeSantis**. "These Community Development Block Grant awards will help improve water and wastewater systems, stormwater infrastructure, roads, and workforce housing. These investments promote long-term economic growth that will help rural Florida families thrive for many years to come."

"Strong infrastructure and thoughtful community planning are essential to creating opportunities in Florida's small and rural communities," said **Secretary of Commerce, J. Alex Kelly**. "Under Governor DeSantis' leadership, these investments will help communities address critical water, wastewater, roadway and infrastructure needs while strengthening economic readiness and long-term resiliency. These projects give local leaders the resources they need to build stronger communities, support businesses and create greater opportunities for Floridians." The following communities will receive an award through the **Small Cities Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program**.

The Small Cities Community Development Block Grant Program, funded by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) and administered by FloridaCommerce, provides funding to eligible local governments for infrastructure, housing and economic development activities that principally benefit low- and moderate-income residents. The Community Planning Technical Assistance Grant Program provides funding to support communities in creating strategic plans to address local economic challenges, meet statutory planning requirements and assist in community resiliency efforts.

**GOVERNOR RON DESANTIS ANNOUNCES \$60 MILLION IN CANCER INNOVATION AWARDS AND**

**OPENS \$70 MILLION APPLICATION CYCLE**

Governor Ron DeSantis announced \$60 million in awards through the Fiscal Year 2025-26 Florida Cancer Innovation Fund and opened the application cycle for Fiscal Year 2026-27, with \$70 million available for new awards, a \$10 million increase over last year.

"Today, I was proud to announce the winners of this year's Florida Cancer Innovation Fund awards and the opening of applications for next year's awards. This promising initiative now has \$70 million in funding for groundbreaking cancer research projects, \$10 million more than the previous cycle," said **Governor DeSantis**. "Congratulations to the awardees, and thank you for all you do to make Florida a beacon of hope in cancer research and treatment."

Since 2019, Florida has invested more than \$1.4 billion in cancer research and treatment, and funding for cancer research programs has increased by more than 175 percent under Governor DeSantis. In Fiscal Year 2026-27 alone, Florida committed nearly \$228 million to cancer research and innovation.

"Governor DeSantis and First Lady Casey DeSantis have shown tremendous leadership in making cancer research a priority in Florida, and I'm incredibly grateful for their continued commitment," said **State Surgeon General Dr. Joseph A. Ladapo**. "These investments give researchers the freedom to ask important questions, explore new ideas, and follow the evidence wherever it leads."

The Florida Cancer Innovation Fund was established in 2023 with an initial investment of \$20 million to support Florida-based researchers, institutions, startups and other entities pursuing innovative approaches to cancer prevention, treatment and cures.

"Governor DeSantis and First Lady Casey DeSantis had a bold vision for what Florida could accomplish in the fight against cancer, and nearly 150 funded projects later, that

vision is paying off for families in every part of our state," said **Agency for Health Care Administration Secretary Shevaun L. Harris**. "From rural communities to major cancer centers, Florida patients are getting access to groundbreaking research and life-changing care close to home. This is what happens when a state decides cancer research is not optional. It is a priority."

Following a rigorous and competitive review process, \$60 million was awarded through the Fiscal Year 2025-26 application cycle to researchers and institutions advancing the next generation of cancer prevention and treatment strategies. The awards support a diverse group of grantees across Florida, from established research institutions to emerging innovators pursuing promising new approaches in the fight against cancer.

The Fiscal Year 2026-27 application cycle is now open, with \$70 million available for new awards, representing a \$10 million increase over last year. Funding will continue to support innovative research in areas including preventive nutrition, emerging medical treatments, data infrastructure and patient-centered solutions designed to improve outcomes.

The Florida Cancer Innovation Fund is part of the state's broader commitment to advancing cancer research and collaboration. Through the Casey DeSantis Cancer Research Program, Cancer Connect Collaborative and other targeted investments, Florida is working to break down barriers between researchers and institutions and accelerate the development of new treatments.

Cancer remains the second leading cause of death in Florida, and nearly 40 percent of Floridians will face a cancer diagnosis during their lifetime. Florida's continued investments are designed to ensure researchers have the resources to pursue breakthroughs while giving patients and families greater access to innovative treatments and hope for the future.

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# Lake County Sheriff's Office Initiatives



The SafetyNet Program assists individuals with cognitive disorders such as Alzheimer's, dementia, autism or anyone who is at risk of wandering. The bracelet contains a unique radio frequency transmitter. If someone goes missing, deputies use special tracking equipment to locate them.



The Emergency Scent Kit is a proactive tool to assist in locating individuals who may wander or go missing — including seniors with cognitive disorders, young children, or vulnerable adults. The Lockbox Program allows first responders to access your home in an emergency. A secure, coded lockbox is placed outside your home, containing a spare key that only authorized emergency personnel can access.

This program is available to Lake County residents who are age 55 or older, or disabled individuals who live alone and/or have significant medical conditions. The program is completely free for eligible Lake County residents.

A trained representative from the Lake County Sheriff's Office will install the lockbox and demonstrate how it works. The secure code is kept confidential and accessible only to responding emergency personnel. The Vial of Life is a free program designed to give emergency responders pertinent medical information. Fill out the form included in the vial and store it in the refrigerator.

Participants place their completed form inside a labeled vial, which is then stored in the refrigerator. A “Vial of Life” sticker is placed on the front door to alert emergency personnel that the information is inside.
