Dear Friends, We have new day! What an exciting time it is to live in Florida and to be a part of an incredible team in the Senate. We are winning battles that your Senator has long been a part of,

and it is very encouraging to see us finally having this much success on so many different fronts.

Just this week, the Florida Senate voted to pass a comprehensive bill that would protect Florida's youth from dangerous gender altering surgeries and treatments. Specifically, the legislation prohibits harmful and irreversible gender reassignment procedures or prescriptions for children and adolescents in Florida. Additionally, the legislation strengthens doctor-patient consultation requirements for adults who seek these same treatments and prohibits the use of telemedicine to ensure that patients are fully informed on the risks associated with these treatments.

The Senate also tackled the issue of social media safety. Senate Bill 52 has flown through all three of its committees and is

ready for a floor vote soon. This legislation requires that the Florida Department of Education create age-appropriate social media safety curriculum and that individual school boards notify parents of this curriculum. Social media safety curriculum will ensure that students in grades 6-12 better understand the social, emotional, and physical effects of social media. Through this curriculum, students will be educated on topics such as addiction, mental health, oversharing of personal information, human trafficking, and many other risks associated with social media.

Additionally, the bill requires that each school district prohibit the use of social media when connected to internet provided by the school. This will ensure that students are focused on educational content when they enter the classroom.

By the time this column reaches you, we will have likely wrapped up budget negotiations between the House and Senate, but we did want to provide a quick look at the product that we put on the table.

The Senate's proposed budget includes \$500 million allocated to the Emergency Preparedness and Response Fund, over \$400 million for workforce development programs, and \$711 million for affordable housing programs as established in Senate

Backyard Boat/ **RV Storage**

(NAPSI)—Boating and RV use rank among the most popular forms of recreation in the U.S. Having attractive, well-designed storage facilities for your boat or RV is important in protecting and enhancing the enjoyment of these assets.

Consider other building uses—Besides boat or RV storage, think about other possible uses for the building so those can be incorporated into the design. Other popular options include offices, kitchenettes, lounges, bathrooms and space for hobbies.

Aesthetics are important-Boat, RV and other recreational storage buildings are typically located near the main residence.



"It's important to think through how the storage building will blend in with and complement the home," Mrozinski says. "Design elements such as exterior colors, roof pitch and a wainscot can result in a beautiful

storage facility rather than just a shed. Accessories such as a porch or a cupola are other ways to personalize the building.'

of doors is necessary to provide convenient access. Window placement is also important so you can see what's going on outside without having to leave the building. "The storage facility should be designed to fit the property and be convenient for owners to easily use and enjoy," he says.


Other recommendations include:

• Design the building layout for functionality and ease of use. For instance, for an RV storage building, placing the tall overhead door to one side reduces water



hose and charging cord tripping hazards when the RV is serviced inside the building.

- Plan sufficient storage for occasionally used equipment as well as support materials to be kept in stock and easy to access when needed.
- Ensure adequate ventilation if you are working on boat or RV engines, as well as for cars, trucks, snowmobiles or fourwheel-drive vehicles.
- Include a floor drain if you will be washing any equipment or pulling in vehicles covered with snow. **Hobby** garages



Mrozinski notes that other types of recreational buildings are also experiencing growing demand, such as a hobby garage or workshop, pool house, garden shed, backyard office, or man cave/she shed. These structures involve many of the same planning and design considerations as for boats and RV storage.

'Vehicle storage, hobby shops and other accessory buildings are among the most requested projects we're now experiencing," Mrozinski says. "Regardless of the intended use, upfront planning is essential to ensure a high- I Directions quality, functional building that can be enjoyed for years to come."





Following State of for Broward County

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. — Attorney

General Ashley Moody is activating Florida's Price Gouging Hotline following reports of extreme flooding in Broward County. The following expansion comes as Gov. Ron DeSantis declares of a state of emergency due to areas of Broward County that are flooded after receiving heavy rainfall of more than 25 inches.

Attorney General Ashley Moody said, "With the declared state of emergency in Broward County for extreme flooding, I am activating Florida's Price Gouging Hotline to protect Floridians from any unlawful increases.

It is important for all residents of Broward County to begin preparations for any additional flooding. This includes having an emergency plan in place and staying informed through local news and weather reports. Attorney General Moody recommends citizens follow the guidance of local officials and take all necessary steps to ensure safety.

Residents of Broward County are encouraged to visit FloridaDisaster.org to stay informed about the latest updates on this potential emergency.

Attorney General subject to civil penalties of \$1,000 per Moody Activates Price violation and up to a total of \$25,000 for Gouging Hotline multiple violations committed in a single 24hour period. In addition to the civil penalties Emergency Declaration for price gouging, state law criminalizes the sale of goods and services to the public without possession of a business tax receipt.

> Attorney General Moody Takes Legal Action to Investigate Whether Biden Used Taxpayer Dollars to Buy Crack Pipes for Drug Addicts

> TALLAHASSEE, Fla.—Attorney General Ashley Moody is demanding information about whether a Biden administration program used taxpayer money to purchase crack pipes for drug addicts. Attorney General Moody is taking legal action against two federal agencies due to withheld information with respect to the program's suspected practices. In February 2022, Florida sent Freedom of Information Act requests to the U.S. Department of Justice and U.S. Department of Health and Human Services seeking records regarding the alleged use of federal grant funds to promote drug use through safe smoking kits-in which some were reportedly found to include crack pipes and other drug-related paraphernalia. Now, more than a year later, with both agencies failing to reply to the state's request, Attorney General Moody is taking DOJ and HHS to court to bring the information to light.

Attorney General Ashley Moody said, "If Biden is using your tax dollars to buy crackpipes for drug addicts, you have the Violators of the price gouging statute are right to know. Our country is in the grips of a

drug overdose crisis, and the Biden administration is stonewalling our requests and keeping the public in the dark about so many misguided, reckless policies. We are taking them to court to get answers for the American people.'

In February 2022, President Biden announced the deadline for service organizations and local governments to apply for \$30 million in federal funding for a so-called harm reduction effort, safe smoking kits. At the time, White House sources claimed that crack pipes or other paraphernalia would not be included in the federally-funded kits-however, a subsequent investigation found several incidences of kits containing such materials.

According to news sources, kits obtained from five major U.S. cities-Baltimore, Boston, New York, Richmond and Washington, D.C.-contained crack pipes.

Kits available from a harm-reduction center located only city-blocks away from the U.S. Capitol and two elementary schools also contained drug paraphernalia.

News of the alleged reckless program comes as the nation is experiencing record drug overdose deaths, while the federal government is deepening the record-high national debt. Drug overdose deaths topped 100,000 in 2021, and the U.S. is currently more than \$31 trillion in debt.

The state of Florida filed a FOIA request for access to federal records regarding this program in February 2022. Now, more than a year later, the agencies are still hiding the records and have not responded to the request. Attorney General Moody is taking legal action to make DOJ and HHS provide relevant information regarding this federal program, so the truth can be uncovered.
