VFW Writing Award

Ocala Post Writer Takes Top VFW Writing Award

A veteran of VFW McCullough-Mixson Post 4209 Ocala has won the top award for feature articles in the 2023 Veterans of Foreign Wars National Publications Contest.

Michael P. Mauer, a Desert Storm veteran, won the Grand Award for his article, 'VFW Motorcycle Riders.' The submission appeared in the August 2022 edition of the South Hills - Mon Valley Messenger, and placed first in competition after a judges' review by two non-VFW affiliated journalism professionals.

Mauer wrote the article while assigned as the VFW PA District 29 public affairs officer. This is his fourth VFW writing award in seven years.

Mauer has written scores of articles about the VFW and veterans over the last three decades. These stories have been printed in local, regional and state-wide publications. Last year, Mauer won the Bronze Award and in 2020, the Silver Award for best feature

article in the VFW National Publications Contest. In 2016, he earned the Grand Award. He has been a life member of the VFW since 1995. He has also received citations for his work over the years with the VFW from both the Pennsylvania State Senate and the House of Representatives. Also, he was appointed a VFW National Aide-De-Camp in 2006.

He is a member of Military Veterans in Journalism.

A Bethel Park Pennsylvania native, Mauer's name is one of hundreds inscribed on the Veteran's Memorial near the borough's municipal building. He attended Bethel Park Senior High School before earning a bachelor's degree in journalism and communications from Point Park University in 1984.

Jeanette Nuñez and Department of Elder Affairs Secretary Michelle Branham were joined by local leaders, advocates, and caregivers in Marion County to celebrate recent budget funding to support Florida's advancements in service and care for individuals with Alzheimer's disease and related dementias. During the 2023 Legislative Session, Governor DeSantis proposed and secured record funding for Alzheimer's care.

"With Governor DeSantis at the helm, Florida has put our seniors first when they needed it most," said Lieutenant Governor Jeanette Nuñez. "The Framework for Freedom Budget included over \$65 million for Alzheimer's support, an increase of more than \$12.5 million over the last year. We will continue to fund, support, and fight for those who live with Alzheimer's disease, their families, and caregivers."

The state budget, signed by Governor DeSantis in June, included \$12.5 million in additional funding to expand the work of the state's 17 Memory Disorder Clinics and the Alzheimer's Disease Initiative, which assist residents and caregivers affected by the disease. This also includes nearly \$500,000 in support for the Alzheimer's Association's Brain Bus, a mobile outreach unit that helps educate Floridians on early warning signs and available resources.

An estimated 580,000 people aged 65 and older in Florida are living with Alzheimer's disease, and around 827,000 Floridians are serving as family caregivers. FACE pairs Care Navigators with individuals, families, and caregivers to bridge connections to local resources and services for Alzheimer's disease. 

The previous two columns we have been reporting to you on the 2023 Legislative Session and today we are bringing you the third installment in this series. This month we will

continue by highlighting some other passed legislation that will be of interest to you.

Last month's release of the blockbuster film "Sound of Freedom" has captivated American audiences and, rightfully so, brought much attention and awareness to the devastation of human trafficking. Florida continues to lead on this front to the best of our ability (our federal government must step up and secure our borders!) and a number of bills were passed to help us combat this issue. One such bill was SB 7064 by Senator Ileana Garcia. This bill requires that law enforcement officers successfully complete 4 hours of training in identifying and investigating human trafficking as part of their basic recruit training or additional training. The Criminal Justice Standards and Training Commission will develop the training in consultation with the Department of Legal Affairs and the Statewide Council on Human Trafficking. Further, SB 7064 also establishes the state's unified Statewide Data Repository for Anonymous Human Trafficking Data at the

University of South Florida Trafficking in Persons - Risk to Resilience Lab. The human trafficking data, which must be submitted by law enforcement agencies and other entities, will be used to aid in combatting human trafficking, prosecuting those engaged in human trafficking, and assisting victims of human trafficking.

The Biden Administration has failed to protect our border. Because of this, Florida is now under a declared state of emergency. The Florida Senate cannot independently fix the immigration process in this country, but we can make it clear that we value law and order, and we value the lives of immigrants being smuggled in to this country. SB 1718 requires private employers, with 25 or more employees, to use E-Verify for new employees, beginning on July 1, 2023. Also, any employer who knowingly hires an unauthorized alien will face penalties of license suspension or revocation. The bill makes human smuggling a second degree felony adds human smuggling to the list of crimes that allow for prosecution under Florida's Racketeer Influenced and Corrupt Organization (RICO) Act. The legislation provides for invalidating driver's licenses exclusively issued by another state to undocumented immigrants, and requires the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles (DHSMV) to issue citations and maintain a list of out-of-state classes of driver licenses that are invalid.

The Florida Senate is committed to protecting our communities from the influx of deadly drugs on our streets. As criminals imperative that we provide law enforcement the tools they need to stop them in their tracks. Synthetic alternatives of fentanyl are Internet emerging in our country that are even more dangerous. SB 736 takes a proactive step by placing nitazene a drug much more potent than heroine or morphine, on the Schedule I substance list, empowering prosecutors to bring the full power of the law and help get these drugs off the streets. HB 365 makes it a second degree felony or a first degree felony (second or subsequent offense) for an adult to unlawfully distribute heroin, fentanyl, fentanyl-related substances, and mixtures containing any of these substances, and an to workforce, education and health injury or overdose results, when such substance or mixture is proven to have caused or been a substantial factor in causing the injury or overdose. The bill ranks the second degree felony in level 6 of the Criminal Punishment Code offense severity ranking chart.

We hope you find this informative and encouraging. Florida is strong, and we continue to lead this country on very important issues. Thank you for letting me serve you in the Florida Senate.

(OCALA, FL.) July 1, 2023 - On Saturday, July 1, at approximately 11:09 a.m., Ocala Fire Rescue's Engines 1, 2, 3, and 5, Rescues 3 and 5, Tower 1, Battalion Chiefs 11 and 22, and a Safety Officer responded to reports of a structure fire at Berkeley Pointe Apartments, 2847 NE Seventh St.

As units traveled to the scene, Dispatch advised that the apartment building was filling with smoke and tenants were

Engine 5 arrived to find a two-story, multi-family apartment building with a working fire in a first-floor unit. Smoke and flames were visible from the unit's backroom window.

Crews were informed that a dog was inside the unit on fire.

Rescue 3 conducted a primary search, finding and retrieving the dog from the smoke-filled apartment, while Engine 3 secured a hydrant and Engine 5 attacked the

Tower 1 searched the fire room and assessed the state of the second-floor unit directly above the apartment where the fire originated.

Engines 1 and 2 assisted with ventilation. Engine 2 was later assigned to search for hidden fire spots.

With hot spots addressed and the structure ventilated, the fire inspector could enter the area to identify the cause of the





Teachers Civics Seal of Excellence

More Than 11,000 Florida Teachers Receive Civics Seal of Excellence Endorsement

Each educator earning a Civics Seal of Excellence Endorsement receives a stipend worth \$3,000 each

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. — Today, Governor Ron DeSantis announced Florida has awarded 11,000 teachers more than \$33 million for completing civics training offered by the Florida Department of Education. The educators have completed either the Summer Civics Professional Learning Series or the first-of-its-kind Civics Seal of Excellence Endorsement, which equip teachers with the knowledge and skills to provide high-quality civics instruction.

Governor DeSantis and the Florida Department of Education (FDOE) launched the Civics Seal of Excellence in January, and more than 10,000 teachers registered for the course within the first week. Course enrollment is at capacity with 20,000 teachers enrolled and an additional 11,000 educators on the waiting list. FDOE enlisted the assistance of nationally recognized civics experts to create the 50-hour online program that contains over 28 hours of high-quality video lessons focused on America's history, civics, and government.

"Understanding the founding principles of our nation is the key to protecting and maintaining our republic for generations to come," said Governor Ron DeSantis. "Florida teachers are leading the way in civics education, which is demonstrated by our student success, especially when compared to the rest of the nation. Congratulations to our educators who have taken advantage of Florida's unique civics professional learning opportunities."

"Through state leadership and the commitment of thousands of educators, Florida has provided students unprecedented civics education," said Commissioner of Education Manny Diaz, Jr. "Thank you to Governor DeSantis for distributing \$33 million to teachers who

have completed civics training to better prepare their students to become civically engaged and honor their responsibilities as American citizens."

"The Civics Seal of Excellence course should be a model for the entire nation," said Kelley Mathews, Social Studies Teacher at Fort White High School in Columbia County. "The text assignments and materials are extremely valuable in making connections between historical context and modern day applications. I teach U.S. Government, Economics, African American History, Law Studies, and Florida History, and this course will benefit each and every one of these classes."

Since taking office, Governor DeSantis has prioritized civics education. In 2020, Governor DeSantis established the Florida Civics and Debate Initiative (FCDI), the first statewide program of its kind focused on using debate as a tool to enrich civics education. Schools that participate in the FCDI have demonstrated higher pass rates on both the Civics and U.S. History End-of-Course Exams than schools without an FCDI team. The application form for schools to join the FCDI for the 2023–2024 school year is available at: Florida Civics and Debate Initiative Participation Request SY 23–24.

The Civics Literacy Excellence Initiative was created in July 2021 to continue elevating civic literacy and education for Florida's students. Efforts within the Civics Literacy Excellence Initiative include the Civics Seal of Excellence, professional learning aligned to the revised civics and government standards, the Portraits in Patriotism oral history resources, Stories of Inspiration, and Civics Academies.



Cutting-Edge **Technology**

Learning to Save Lives With Cutting-**Edge Technology**

(NAPSI)—For most people, a college education can lead to a better life, but for one group of students at a unique institution, it can lead to saving lives.

EMS Education

At Texas State Technical College (TSTC), the Emergency Medical Services program has taken training students to a new level with the introduction of the first complete ambulance simulator in North America.

Echo Healthcare delivered to TSTC's Abilene campus a Ford F350 ambulance that was converted from a road-operating vehicle to a full-size simulator.

Coby Meyer, Echo Healthcare's chief operating officer, explained the reason: When it comes to

Why It's Needed

According to onetonline.org, the need for paramedics in Texas was expected to grow

19% between 2020 and 2030. The annual to the Immersive Interactive lab, which will average salary for paramedics in Texas is \$48,380.

In its Emergency Medical Services program, TSTC offers an Associate of Applied Science degree in Paramedic, as well as certificates of completion in Emergency Medical Services—EMT, Emergency Medical Services—Advanced EMT (AEMT), and Emergency Medical Services—Paramedic. The program is available at the Abilene, Brownwood and Harlingen campuses.

How it Works

To turn the ambulance into a classroom. the engine was replaced with SimLeader technology and the windshield and side windows are now equipped with large video monitors that give trainees the feeling of actually traveling on various roadways.

The ambulance is used to play out different scenarios. Students begin by responding to a medical scene in TSTC's Immersive Interactive lab. The scene, displayed on three walls and the floor in a different classroom, could range from a city park to a family home.

The trainees arrive on the scene to find a medical manikin. They assess the patient and begin the transport process from the scene to the ambulance. Once loaded into the ambulance, one student will be in the back treating the patient while the other will

Instructors will be able to see what is happening through video monitors, letting them change road conditions through the installed computer programming. Those road conditions could include skidding on ice or hitting a pothole, which will actually give those inside the feeling that they are sliding or bouncing.

Once the students arrive at the virtual hospital, the patient will be transported back be reset into a virtual emergency room.

'Cutting-edge technology in EMS education accomplishes much more than providing an efficient, safe and realistic opportunity for students to learn," said Ronnie Pitts, director of decision support of TSTC's Allied Health division. "TSTC creates learning environments that inspire students to embrace innovation, adapt to technological advancements, and actively contribute to the rapidly evolving world. We are preparing them to be future leaders, problem-solvers and contributors in a technology-driven society in as lifelike a simulation as possible.'

Good For The Profession

For ambulance companies, the simulator will save time spent in training employees. We send our EMTs to a two- to three-day course for them to learn how to drive an ambulance," said Will Hendon, the North

Texas regional director of Global Medical Response and a 2010 TSTC EMS graduate. "Imagine driving a smaller car your entire life. Getting into the driver's seat of an ambulance will feel overwhelming. It brakes differently than a regular vehicle, and it accelerates differently. This is going to help ambulance companies in that respect the most."





"To have someone actually in the driver's seat so we will be able to communicate time and distance from the hospital will be vital to our training," he said. "Our entire career is built around good communication."

GENERAL MOODY WARNS **ABOUT SWEEPSTAKES** SCAMS ON NATIONAL **LOTTERY DAY**

TALLAHASSEE, Fla.—Today is National

Lottery Day, and Attorney General Ashley Moody is releasing a Consumer Alert warning Floridians about sweepstakes scams. Lottery scams often begin when a scammer calls or sends messages to targets, often seniors, claiming the target won a prize. The scammer will then request service fees or financial information from the target stating that this is necessary for the winnings to be transferred.

Attorney General Ashley Moody said, "Receiving a message that you have won a large cash prize can be exciting, but it's also likely a scam. If you receive one of these messages, be suspicious, do some research and never open any links included in the message. For more tips to avoid lottery scams, check out our latest Consumer Alert.'

When scammers impersonate a credible lottery source and promise large winnings, targets could be fooled and may eagerly pay to receive a prize that will never be delivered. Targets are often asked to keep the winnings confidential helping scammers hide fraudulent efforts. For more information on the latest lottery scams, see the advisory recently released by Mega Millions.

To avoid lottery scams:

- contacts an individual regarding winnings in a game that the player never entered;

sweepstakes will not require winners to pay anything to receive a prize;

· Never provide banking or personal information over the phone to an unsolicited caller purporting that a fee is required to receive lottery winnings; and

- Know that winners will never be asked or required to keep prizes confidential.

ATTORNEY GENERAL MOODY WARNS DOJ AGAINST POLITICALLY-MOTIVATED INVESTIGATION OF FLORIDA'S IMMIGRANT RELOCATION **PROGRAM**

TALLAHASSEE, Fla.—Attorney General Ashley Moody is warning the U.S. Department of Justice against a politicallymotivated investigation of Florida's immigrant relocation program. In a letter to the DOJ, Attorney General Moody states that there is no legal basis for California's request for the DOJ to investigate the program. Attorney General Moody's letter responds to a request by the California Governor and Attorney General to the DOJ to investigate Florida and defends the state's actions to transport illegal immigrants to sanctuary cities on a volunteer basis. The letter also - Be aware that the Florida Lottery never points out that California's request is a political stunt and not a legal request, as California's letter does not identify any - Be cognizant that a legitimate violation of federal statute, judicial decision

or law.

Attorney General Ashley Moody said, "California's letter requesting that the U.S. Department of Justice investigate Florida is a ridiculous political stunt. Our voluntary immigration relocation program is lawful, and California's request fails to identify any violation of federal law. As an Attorney General who leads hundreds of highlyqualified lawyers and has led dozens of legal challenges against this administration, it is jarring that California is not competent enough to articulate even a minimal legal basis for its request. I thought California loved to tout its commitment to illegal immigrants, but now its governor does not want more immigrants in California, claiming that more of them could break his state—how ironic.

Attorney General Moody is strongly urging the DOJ to not bail out California or engage in another political investigation. The letter states, "You have repeatedly stated that and its citizens."

'political or other improper considerations must play no role in any investigative or prosecutorial decisions.' Yet, the Democrat Governor and Attorney General of the State of California invite you to do exactly that in their letter to you dated July 6, 2023...While I would urge you not to bail out California or engage in another political investigation or litigation, if you make the unconscionable and unfounded determination to do so, Florida stands ready to fight against DOJ's overreach. Florida has had tremendous success litigating against DOJ under the Biden Administration and I and Florida's lawyers stand ready to depose, subpoena, and question Biden Administration officials in connection with such a proceeding... TALLAHASSEE, Fla. — Today, Governor Ron

DeSantis announced the award of \$300 million in state funding from the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) for 71 new resilience and adaptation projects and three previously awarded projects to help prepare coastal and inland communities for the adverse impacts of flooding and storm surge.

The Framework for Freedom budget is a testament to our unwavering commitment to protect Florida's communities and secure their economic vitality," said Governor Ron DeSantis. "Florida is a storm-prone state, and following two back-to-back hurricanes last year, this funding advances Florida's continuing efforts to strengthen our infrastructure and fortify against the impacts of storm surge and flooding."

Last month, Governor DeSantis signed the Framework for Freedom Budget for Fiscal Year 2023-24, solidifying Florida's position as a national leader in resilience action. In the budget is \$356 million for resilience, which includes \$300 million for implementing statewide resilience projects as well as \$56 million for resilience planning and coral reef protection.

"We are grateful for Governor DeSantis" steadfast dedication to the resilience of our state," said Department of Environmental Protection Secretary Shawn Hamilton. "The funding for this year's Statewide Flooding

Additionally, DEP announced the award of over \$28 million to develop or update comprehensive vulnerability assessments. At the conclusion of these assessments, all 67 counties in Florida will have completed a vulnerability assessment.

> DEP is currently accepting grant applications through the Resilient Florida Grant Program until Sept. 1, 2023, for new proposed projects that could be funded in the next Statewide Flooding and Sea Level Rise Resilience Plan. Some of these proposals aim to protect critical assets such as transportation and evacuation routes; critical infrastructure; critical community and emergency facilities; and natural, cultural, and historical resources.
